

Commemorate the 80th Anniversary of D-Day

The D-Day landings of 6th June 1944 was the largest seaborne invasion in history. Along with the associated airborne operations, it marked the beginning of the liberation of France and western Europe.

Unprecedented coordination between Allied nations, and the intensive planning of engineers, meteorologists, logisticians and countless more, led to a force from 13 countries approaching Normandy in a 5000-vessel armada.

In the early hours of D-Day, 24,000 paratroopers and glider-borne troops landed behind German lines to provide tactical support. Massive naval and aerial bombardments attempted to suppress the German defences and weaponry. Then a ground force of more than 130,000 troops came ashore on five beaches across a 50-mile stretch of Normandy coast, with the first waves often facing intact defences. By the end of D-Day there had been 10,000 allied casualties. Yet this was only the beginning. The ensuing Battle of Normandy was to last into August and cost tens of thousands of lives as it defeated and repulsed the occupying German forces eastwards. It was a decisive success for the Allies and paved the way for the liberation of much of north west Europe.

LETTER FOR JUNE

Dear Friends,

Well it's June already and we're heading for halfway through the year. The Summer Solstice is on 21st and then the days will start to imperceptibly shorten again. (Now where did I put those Christmas decorations?)

For those of us who grew up in the Fylde, June will for ever be 'Club day month'. Processions, Rose Queens, bands, sports, and of course the all-important fairground are etched in our memories.

Treales, Wharles and Roseacre do not have a tradition of Club Days and hence hitherto no Rose Queen; but all that is to change this year when Miss Isla Gilbertson will be crowned as our very first Rose Queen and, together with her retinue, will open our D-day Picnic Fun Day on Sunday 9th June.

I think the reason Treales has never had a Club Day goes back to the origins of the tradition. Back in the 1800's when many working people in Lancashire were employed in the great cotton mills, it was necessary for the mills to close for a week each year for the mighty boilers to be shut down and serviced, so the workers in effect got a weeks holiday (Wakes week) - but of course without pay. To address this problem, Friendly Societies sprang up organising holiday savings clubs into which the workers paid every week. These savings were paid out on the day the mills closed for their annual 'wakes' week and it rapidly became a fixed tradition that the communities would celebrate with processions, feasting and fairground rides.

In those days employment in rural communities like our three villages was almost entirely on the land, and farms of course did not, and do not close for a week. Farming has always been a 365 days a year occupation and so there was no need for holiday clubs because there were no official holidays - so no Club Day and no Rose Queen.

Happily, we have in recent times joined together with Kirkham and Wesham in the annual procession of witness and, thanks to the hard work of our school staff, their dedicated helpers, and many parents, Christ Church Treales will in future have a significant presence in the procession on Club day including the traditional Rose Queen and retinue.

The amount of planning and hard work required in order for this enrichment of our church life to happen is enormous, particularly as everything has to be created from scratch, so please be as generous as you can with your time and talents if there is anything you can do to help. Our school head Lisa, Cheryl,

Mhairi, Janet or I will be delighted to hear from anyone who would like to participate in the organising of what is sure to be a wonderful weekend in June.

And when all the fun and festivities are in full swing, we will with some satisfaction be able to say, 'we are witnessing to, and reaching out to, our local community.'

Something precious

I thank God for the gifts he has given me; the places he calls me to be and the opportunities I have to serve in his name.

As both scientist and priest, I still teach and research in the Cancer Sciences, and last week I had the privilege of attending our annual European Conference on Radiotherapy. Something precious in itself – bringing together thousands from all disciplines to share experiences and research; new ways to improve the outcomes for our patients. It is precious to see the desire and enthusiasm of so many, sharing ideas and developments; all to serve our patients better. Being there, I see their God-given gifts – their vocation and calling. It has been the same for me too, my whole life - working in God's service for patients through my science, as well as serving through my faith ... it's something very precious.

Precious too were the disciples around Jesus at that momentous last supper, where, towards the end of his discourse with them, Jesus prays to the Father for them — his precious high-priestly prayer. For as part of his own mission, Jesus called the disciples to come and see, be with him; to follow, learn, understand on this amazing journey with him.

But now the journey must continue differently - through their vocation and calling; their most precious gifts and talents, the things Jesus no doubt saw in all their hearts. He has taught them the character of the Father; whilst developing their own relationship with the Son.

They are special, precious - as indeed we all are to God our Father, as brothers and sisters, all people with Christ. They will need the power of the coming spirit to keep them in that special relationship – yes, as one with God the Father and Jesus; but also with all within the faith, as the body of Christ, the common love of God and neighbour will bind them all, in the power of the spirit.

May we therefore celebrate the precious beings we are in the eyes of a loving Father and his beloved Son; through the many things we are called to do. May we rejoice that we are all special, chosen to be distinctive, precious and wonderful individuals - all loved by our creator God.
