


Summer term is always a very busy time in school. Children have been representing school in sports events such as football, cricket, tennis and rounders as well as going on school trips (our youngest children had so much fun learning about science at Imagine That! in Liverpool) and getting ready for all our end of year events.

Throughout school, children have completed statutory assessments, showing their resilience and perseverance. We love celebrating all the progress and achievements of the children throughout the year and in the end of year reports, services and celebrations.

A highlight of the term was Kirkham Club Day. We walked as a school and church with Isla leading us as Rose Queen with her retinue. The sun shone and we sang our way through Kirkham and Wesham!













The children marked the 80th anniversary of D-Day in school, preparing a song, prayers and display work for the D-Day service and picnic in church.

Look out for our displays and entries at the Fylde Vintage Steam and Farm Show and Great Eccleston Agricultural Show.

This month we have begun our work with Jess from OPAL (Outdoor Play and Learning). We want to promote more active childhoods, which is one of the many reasons we are improving our playtime, as well as to improve opportunities for socialisation, cooperation, coordination, resilience, creativity, imagination and enjoyment for our children.

We strongly believe that: "Play is freely chosen, personally directed, intrinsically motivated behaviour that actively engages the child. Play can be fun or serious. Through play children explore social, material and imaginary worlds and their relationship with them, elaborating all the while a flexible range of responses to the challenges they encounter. By playing, children learn and develop as individuals, and as members of the community." (Children's Play Council 2001).

The project will start in September for our children and our hopes are that it will change the way we think and how we play together. To facilitate this project and allow us to be ready for September, we will need to buy some new resources, move some things around on the playground and require some loose parts. Loose parts are any materials that can be easily moved, combined, and incorporated into children's free play. The items we are looking for will enable us to enjoy a wider range of play experiences during playtime (see below for some examples):

Suitcases of any size and type

Anything on wheels/castors

Plastic milk crates/supermarket delivery crates/plastic bread trays

Briefcases, especially hard cased ones

Road signs and cones

Kitchen pots, pans, baking trays, work tables, wooden spoons, chopping boards

Tools like small spades/shovels, trowels and brooms

Tubes of various sizes and various materials

Buckets

Nets and thick ropes

Keyboards/torches/laptops/calculators/mobile phones/desk phones/ webcams/cameras that are no longer working Fabric (large sheets/brightly coloured fabric)

Foam sheets/bodyboards/camping roll mats/yoga mats

Wooden pallets

Metal frames

Cable drums

Guttering

Noodles (the type you use in the swimming pool!)

Hats/scarves/jazzy shirts/elasticated skirts/waistcoats/wedding

dresses/character costumes

Pegs (to help to set up dens)

If you have any of these resources and feel able to donate them to school, we are holding a collection period from Friday 20th July. Please drop all items off at the back of school (through the gate near church) and leave under one of the gazebos. We can't wait to make our playtimes even better and share our OPAL journey with you over the next year.

We look forward to inviting all members of our community to come and see our school at work on 14th and 15th October. These are our open days, a perfect opportunity if you are looking for a school place for your child or a member of community who wants to visit and see our school in action! We look forward to meeting you!

Letter for July

Dear Friends,

After a most enjoyable (albeit soggy) Club Day and D-day Commemoration Weekend in June, I wonder what sort of summer we are going to have. It is of course St Swithun's day on 15th of July when, according to an old tradition if it rains on that day, then it will carry on raining for forty days.

Believe it or not, there is actually a scientific background to this belief. Meteorological records show that the jet stream usually stays put from the middle of July to the middle of August. Now, if it is to the north of the UK when it parks itself, then high pressure systems draw up warm dry continental weather to our shores. If it is over or to the south of the UK however, then we are treated to a succession of low pressure systems which bring with them cold wet Atlantic weather.

I very much doubt that Swithun, the Bishop of Winchester, knew anything about the jet stream in the ninth century, so I'm not inclined to credit him with originating the myth.

St Swithun is a saint about whom very little can be proved but much has been invented. And I am left wondering if his saintliness was a product of holy commerce. The only miracle attributed to him during his lifetime was to reconstruct some eggs. A poor old woman had set her basket of eggs on a bridge and builders of a nearby church broke them. Whereupon St Swithun, the Bishop of Winchester, made them whole once more. Mock not: it's a useful skill - just ask Humpty Dumpty.

There are more than 10,000 saints recognised by the Roman Catholic church so I suppose it is unsurprising that not all of their records stand detailed scrutiny, but it would be quite wrong to denigrate veneration of the Saints just because of a few dodgy dossiers. Accounts of miracles of the past bring hope for the present to countless thousands of people in despair, and thankfully many miracles still occur - some relatively minor, but others sensational and beyond our understanding.

That said, I'm not going to pray for a miracle when it comes to our Summer weather, I'm content to leave it to mother nature and be thankful that God provides both sun and rain to grow our crops; and for that we should always be grateful.

Pat and Janet were re-elected for another year as churchwardens. Our churchwardens are always especially important to us, they work very hard and we thank them sincerely for this and for all the support they give in the Parish.

Embracing Biodiversity

Many of you may be aware that the Parish Council with the help and cooperation of the TRW Sow and Grow Group is adopting an environmentallyfriendly approach to managing our open spaces. We are embarking on a mission to enhance biodiversity by incorporating bulbs and perennial wildflowers into our grassy areas and some of the grass verges.

Supporting Biodiversity in Collaboration

In partnership with the County and Borough Councils, our rural Parish is perfectly positioned to make a significant contribution to biodiversity. By managing our road verges to create habitats, we can play a crucial role in preserving our natural heritage. Wildflowers and native plants not only support wildlife but also add a splash of colour and charm to our landscape—a beauty that is at risk of being lost without our intervention.

Celebrating Native Beauty

Our primary goal is to use UK native plants to showcase the natural splendour of our Parish, planting them in a style that complements the countryside. This initiative not only promotes ecological balance but also creates stunning, naturalistic displays that highlight the inherent beauty of our local flora.

Phase 1: A Blooming Success

Phase 1 of our project has been successful. We planted a total of 66,000 bulbs, which many of you enjoyed in full bloom this spring. These vibrant displays marked the beginning of our journey towards a more biodiverse environment.





Phase 2: Perennial Planting

As we move into Phase 2, we are preparing to plant over 2,000 perennial plug plants within the next three weeks. Species like Ox-eye Daisy, Musk Mallow, Meadow Cranesbill, and Foxglove, standing 2-3 feet tall, will take centre stage. These plants will bloom after the tulips, creating a seamless transition of colour and life above their leaves and the grass.

A Commitment to Annual Maintenance

Our maintenance strategy is both simple and effective. We plan to implement a single cut at the end of the year, after the flowers have shed their seeds. This method supports a thriving habitat for invertebrates and other wildlife, which are essential to our countryside but have been declining year after year.

Join Us in Supporting Biodiversity

We invite all Parish residents to support this initiative by allowing roadside grass to grow. This single action is the most impactful way to encourage insect life, small mammals, invertebrates, and reptiles. These creatures, in turn, support a host of other wildlife, including bats and birds, enriching our countryside's biodiversity.

Call for Volunteers

Our efforts to enhance biodiversity cannot succeed without your help. We are seeking volunteers to assist with planting and maintenance. Whether you can help plant bulbs, grow perennial wildflower plants from seed, or lend a hand in other ways, your involvement is invaluable. Your contribution is vital to the success of this project.

Looking Ahead

Our future plans include planting more bulbs, such as Bluebells and Wild Garlic, in suitable grass verges. We understand that there was a gap in blooming after the bulbs finished this year, and we appreciate your patience. We are confident that next year, our combined efforts will result in continuous flowering throughout the season.

We extend our deepest gratitude to everyone who has helped so far, whether by planting bulbs or growing perennial wildflower plants from seed. Your efforts are greatly appreciated and are making a tangible difference.

Together, let's create a more biodiverse and vibrant environment for our community, showcasing the natural beauty of our lovely Parish.

In a few weeks over a thousand Year 6 pupils from our church primary schools across the Diocese, will gather in the Cathedral for a service of celebration. As well as giving thanks for their journey through the education system so far, it will be an opportunity for them to look forward to the adventure ahead. Pupils will be reminded that they are, and always will be part of the big family of church schools and a child of God. God who loves them and has a plan for their lives.

The theme of the service is based on a song written by Chip Kendall, 'Love where you Live'. If we show love to those around us in the ways that Jesus showed us how to love, then we will be part of creating a community that loves.

This would quite literally change the world. In the parable of the mustard seed, we hear that the Kingdom of Heaven is like a tiny seed that grows into an enormous tree where the birds make their nests. Seeds come in all shapes and sizes, but they always miraculously transform into something bigger. If we 'love where we live' even in the smallest of ways God will recognise and bless this love. The love we show will grow bigger than we can imagine.

Where love is being 'planted' a community grows and people will want to build their 'nests'. Now is the time to take action 'you can make a difference'.
