

# **Open letter to the Diocese of Blackburn**

12th November 2024

Dear Friends,

This will have been a very tense and difficult week for many in the Church of England, not least for survivors of abuse. These survivors will have found it very hard indeed to see abuse such as that which was perpetrated by John Smyth discussed across all media and retraumatised when the response of the Church, which fell so short, has been laid bare.

We write in this context and in response to the news that the Archbishop of Canterbury has chosen to resign following criticism he has received following the publication of the Makin Report into the activities of the serial abuser John Smyth.

The Archbishop has been a bold and dedicated servant of the Church who has contributed to our common life in so many ways. His threefold focus on prayer, reconciliation and evangelism has been an inspiration to many and has doubtless made an impact on the culture of the Church of England.

However it is only right that those in the most senior positions are held to the highest standards, and his decision to step aside following the revelations in the Makin Report is an understandable one. He leaves with our love and prayers.

As the Church of England, we now have an enormous task in front of us. We need to renew our Church such that it places the needs of the most vulnerable, including survivors of abuse, at the centre. We need to reform our safeguarding culture and processes in order to regain people's confidence. We need to hear the voices of critics as prophetic ones. The challenges sound hard, but we do not face them alone.

Much of the coverage in recent days has suggested that the Archbishop of Canterbury is the 'head' of the Church of England. However the Church of God, of which the Church of England is a small part, has only one Head who is

Jesus Christ. It is he who can forgive sin and grant a fresh start. It is he who awakens our consciences to the needs of the poorest and most vulnerable. It is he who is shaking His Church awake. It is in Him that we will find the renewal we long for.

May this moment of crisis be the time when we offer ourselves to him afresh, and in so doing, find life.

# **Letter for December and January**

Dear Friends,

The letter for the December edition of Parish Press is always a peculiar one to write. Firstly, because we let our wonderful editor and compiler have a month off in January, our December magazine has to contain all the January information - so 'Happy New Year to you all.' Secondly, in order to ensure Susan has sufficient time to produce and distribute the magazine before December commences, the deadline for contributions is mid-November. Thus I find myself writing about Christmassy things shortly after Remembrance Sunday.

When, like me, you find yourself at the grand old age of twenty-eight and a bit, time goes by fast enough without the constant reminder of magazine deadlines. It really does not seem twelve months since last Christmas, but here it is just around the corner again.

But of course we first have the season of Advent; those precious weeks often get lost in the Christmas rush. But Advent should be an important time of repentance and forgiveness, and that is something we need in our national Church more than ever this year.

It is a strange paradox that, in the mind of most people, Christmas is the dominant festival of the church with Easter coming a rather poor second; whilst strangely the period of fasting in the lead up to Easter - Lent, always seems to have a much higher profile than its counterpart, Advent, the lead up to Christmas.

That might be because Advent has always been an ambivalent season in the church's calendar - somewhere between feast and fast. Until the 13th century it was celebrated by the Roman church as a joyful prelude to Christmas - much as most people see it today - whilst the Gallic church kept it as a time of penance. So it's not entirely surprising that our own Western celebration of Advent reflects this duality: on the one hand we prepare to celebrate God made flesh in the joyful story of Christmas, but there is also the Advent theme of impending judgment at the second coming. No wonder we sometimes aren't sure whether we should be fearful or joyful. But actually God's judgment and God's love are almost indistinguishable from each other; two side of the same coins as it were. So let us enjoy Advent as a wonderful prelude to Christmas whilst at the same time recognising the need to repent and ask God's forgiveness for our many failings.

### **Bogus roofing cold callers**

Beware cold callers knocking on doors offering to carry out roofing work. The traders did some work on one householder's roof and asked for £1500 cash. They returned, at a later date, asking for another £6000 claiming the first payment was only for materials. The traders were abusive and threatened the householder and a carer. The cold callers were described as men of large build with Irish accents, they didn't provide any paperwork or cancellation notices.

Beware cold callers alleging there is a problem with householder's roofs which they can fix. When householders refused the traders tried to charge them  $\pounds 150$  for jet washing their drives which they were doing without agreement and with cars still on the drives.

Residents are being warned about traders cold calling around the Thornton Cleveleys area. The traders were driving a bronze estate car, make unknown. In one instance they claimed they were contracted to do roofing work for the resident's neighbour and would sort out some loose slates on the resident's roof cheaply using left over slates. The traders are pushy and aggressive and offered to take the householder to the bank to get cash to pay for work done. The men also made threats to a neighbour who tried to help.

Do not deal with cold callers even if they insist you need emergency repairs urgently. Get quotes, giving you time to think and to get other prices for the work.

Remember, if you agree to a contract in your own home you will have a 14 day right to cancel.

Trading Standards advice is to always say no to cold callers. The Safetrader scheme can help you find a trader in your area, contact 0303 333 1111 or go to www.safetrader.org.uk.

# Scam winter heating subsidy text

Beware receiving a scam text claiming to be from the 'Winter Heating Subsidy Office' alleging that, although the Government has reduced the number of people receiving winter heating bill subsidies, you have obtained the qualification to apply and can do so via the link in the email. This is a phishing scam seeking personal identity details. Do not click on the link.

Information regarding eligibility for the Winter Fuel Payment can be found on Gov.uk website or by ringing the Winter Fuel Payment Centre on 0800 731 0160.

Scam texts can be reported, for free, to the National Cyber Security Centre by forwarding it to 7726.

# **Fake universal credit App**

Beware downloading a Universal Credit App claiming to let users manage their accounts. It is understood that no such official government App exists, and users may be at risk of giving away personal information. Only use the DWP Universal Credit Website.
